




The Purpose of Freemasonry



Camp Chicota is a hundred plus acre location in a Louisiana parish where the MWPHGL of LA sponsors youth events, concerts, etc. and just finished an \$80K swimming pool upgrade. We have had similar resources in the past and if we are ever to have them again it is incumbent on all of us to work together towards the Grand Master's and the jurisdiction's visions.

Masonic Note: A "Lewis"; an iron clamp used to lift up a block of stone. Also the term in Masonry for the son of a Freemason who is often permitted to join the craft at an age younger than tradition requires.



The words Lewis and Louveteau, which, in their original meaning, import two very different things, have in Masonry an equivalent signification - the former being used in English, the

latter in French, to designate the son of a Mason.

The English word Lewis" is a term belonging to operative Masonry, and signifies an iron cramp, which is inserted in a cavity prepared for the purpose in a large stone, so as to give attachment to a pulley and hook, whereby the stone may be conveniently raised to any height, and deposited in its proper position. In this country the Lewis has not been adopted as a symbol in Freemasonry, but in the English ritual it is found among the emblems placed upon the tracing board of the Entered Apprentice, and is used in that degree as a symbol of strength, because, by its assistance, the operative Mason is enabled to lift the heaviest stones with a comparatively trifling exertion of physical power. Extending the symbolic allusion still further,

the son of a Mason is in England called a Lewis," because it is his duty to support the sinking powers and aid the failing strength of his father, or, as Oliver has expressed it, "to bear the burden and heat of the day, that his parents may rest in their old age, thus rendering the evening of their lives peaceful and happy."

My Brothers, Master Masons works of service to each other and our communities is never done.


Master Masons walk the steps, 3, 5 and 7. We have been tried, never denied and are ready to be tried again.



F irst and foremost, I give the honor and praise to my Lord and Savior for continuing to bless me, my family and our great Fraternity. To the Most Worshipful

Melvin M. Thorpe, Grand Master and all brothers & sisters, I pray that the G.A.O.T.U. continues to bless each of you.

Recently while discussing the fraternity with some brothers a thought came across my mind. The statement is very simplistic, "GET BACK TO THE BASICS". What do I mean by this comment one may ask? Well, as Freemasons we put much emphases on ritualistic memorization. As we know the ritualistic work must be performed from memory without aid of the ritual.

However, we tend to overlook a very critical aspect of our craft; that of "understanding, practicing and living" our ritual. We must apply, just as much if not more time to understanding the ritual, as we do to memorizing it. Here's what happens once we further our understanding of our ritual. We become better enabled to "teach" the ritual. The more we teach the ritual, the better Freemasons we become. We're taught that as we increase in knowledge we will improve in social intercourse, but the key is "increase in knowledge". We must continue to practice memorization, but we must understand what we're memorizing.

I challenge each Worshipful Master and lodge to ensure that we never stray away from those lectures within our lodge rooms. These lectures and lessons are paramount to the advancement and ritualistic stability of our fraternity. Second, I challenge each District to develop a "District Degree Team" set with the goals of conferring all three ancient craft degrees. While studying the ritual to prepare for degree work use this time to also "teach" the lessons therein inculcated within the degree. This will ensure a virtuous cycle of knowledgeable brothers within our lodges. Third, take pride in your degree work. Finally, study something of Masonic nature every day. Just spend a few hours reading something about the craft and sharing it with others. Again I say "Get Back To The Basics".

The 164th Annual Celebration of the Festival of the Holy Saints John

When a Masonic Hall has been erected, it is dedicated with certain well-known and impressive ceremonies, to Masonry, Virtue, and Universal Benevolence.

Lodges, however, are differently dedicated. Anciently, they were dedicated to King Solomon, as the founder of ancient craft masonry, and the first Most Excellent Grand Master. Christian Lodges are generally dedicated to St. John the Baptist and St. John the Evangelist; and in every well regulated lodge, there is exhibited a certain point within a circle embordered by two perpendicular lines which represents these two saints. St. John the Baptist, whose festival falls on the 24th of June, and St. John the Evangelist, whose festival occurs on the 27th of December, have been selected by Christian Masons as the patrons of their order; and to them, under the appellation of the "Holy Saints John," all Christian lodges should be dedicated.

History was made Sunday, June 24, 2012, when the MWGM of Maryland (Melvin M. Thorpe) and the MWGM of Washington, D.C., MacKinnon W. Myers, marched in solidarity in celebration of the Festival of the Holy Saints John Parade.





The Conference of Grand Masters is composed of regional representatives or chairman from the following regions; North-East, **Mid-Atlantic**, South-East, Mid-West, South-West, Pacific-Rim, and Four Corners. During the conference each regional chairman along with his committee

members (regional Grand Masters) presented a "white" paper report. The topics of these white papers are either assigned by the Conference President or generated by the regional conferences and submitted for discussion in the national forum. One such topic was generated by correspondence submitted by Imperial Potentate Donald R. Parks, A.E.A.O.N.M.S., Inc. "What is the Relationship between the Shrine and Prince Hall Masonry?"

Other topics discussed where administrative corrections to forms, jurisdictional proclamations to name Prince Hall a "Founding Father", concerns with regard to bogus organizations and a variety of other topics. There were committee reports presented and an excellent power point presentation by Sir KT. Bazemore of NC. During the conference there were workshops for the Grand Wardens, Treasurers, Secretaries and for the Chairmen, Committee on Foreign Correspondence.

Although the agenda covered most of Thursday-Saturday time there was an opportunity on Wednesday, May 16th, for those that wanted to take the 3-4 hr bus trip to the Grand Canyon. In my opinion the trip was worth the time to see God's awesome creation. The known history of the Grand Canyon area stretches back 10,500 years, when the first evidence of human presence in the area is found. Native Americans have inhabited the Grand Canyon and the area now covered by Grand Canyon National Park for at least the last 4,000 of those years.







Maryland Prince Hall Masons Receive Montford Point Marines Congressional Gold Medal

From 1798 to 1942, the Marine Corps denied African-Americans the opportunity to serve as Marines. However, in 1942, President Franklin D. Roosevelt established a presidential directive giving African-American men an opportunity to be recruited into the Marine Corps. These African-Americans, coming from every state in the Union, were not sent to the traditional boot camps of Parris Island, South Carolina and San Diego, California. Instead, African-American Marine recruits were segregated and assigned to basic training at Montford Point, a newly established site at Camp Lejeune, North Carolina. Before the gates closed in 1949, approximately 20,000 African-American recruits received training at Montford Point Camp. These Marines served honorably in Saipan, Guam, Tinian, Peleliu, Iwo Jima and Okinawa.

During World War II, the initial intent of Marine Corps leadership was to discharge these African-American Marines after the war and return them to civilian life, thereby leaving the Marine Corps an all-white service. Once given the chance to prove themselves, it became impossible to deny the fact that African-American Marines were just as capable as all other Marines, regardless of race, color, creed or national origin.

The Marines who trained at Montford Point served with honor, courage and commitment in defense of freedom as a part of the 'Greatest Generation' and beyond. Their perseverance in the midst of adversity is a shining testament to their undaunted character and sacrifice-endeavors that led our nation to victory and forever pulled down racial barriers that existed in the military.

During the week of 25 June, a number of events occurred, to include the awarding of the Congressional Gold Medal and a parade at Marine Barracks 8th & I, Washington, DC to recognize their military service alongside other famous World War II groups, such as the Navajo Code Talkers and the Tuskegee Airmen. One of several Montford Point Marines to receive the Congressional Gold Medal was none other than Brother Charles E. Frazier of Pythagoras Lodge No. 74, 2nd Masonic District.

Bro. Frazier is 87 yrs old. He was raised in Pythagoras Lodge #74 in 1979. His other affiliations are; charter member King Solomon Chapter, Holy Royal Arch Masons, 1999, Western Maryland Consistory #270, 1988, Anwar Temple #219, 1989, and he became a Grand Inspector General in 2006.

<u>A MASON'S HEALTH</u> Topic: Cancer

Cancer Update from Johns Hopkins:

1. Every person has cancer cells in the body. These cancer cells do not show up in the standard tests until they have multiplied to a few billion. When doctors tell cancer patients that there are no more cancer cells in their bodies after treatment, it just means the tests are unable to detect the cancer cells because they have not reached the detectable size.

2. Cancer cells occur between 6 to more than 10 times in a person's lifetime.

3. When the person's immune system is strong the cancer cells will be destroyed and prevented from multiplying and forming tumors.

4. When a person has cancer it is believed that the person has nutritional deficiencies. These could be due to genetic, but also to environmental, food and lifestyle factors.

5. To overcome the nutritional deficiencies, changing diet to eat more adequately and healthy, 4-5 times/day and by including supplements the immune system will be strengthen.

6. Chemotherapy involves poisoning the rapidly-growing cancer cells and also destroys rapidly-growing healthy cells in the bone marrow, gastrointestinal tract etc., and can cause organ damage, like liver, kidneys, heart, lungs etc.

7. Radiation, while destroying cancer cells, also burns, scars and damages healthy cells, tissues and organs.

8. Initial treatment with chemotherapy and radiation will often reduce tumor size, however prolonged use of chemotherapy and radiation will not result in more tumor destruction.

9. When the body has too much toxic burden from chemotherapy and radiation the immune system is either compromised or destroyed, hence the person can succumb to various kinds of infections and complications.

10. Chemotherapy and radiation can cause cancer cells to mutate and become resistant and difficult to destroy. Surgery can also cause cancer cells to spread to other sites.

11. An effective way to battle cancer is to starve the cancer cells by not feeding it with the foods it needs to multiply.

***CANCER CELLS FEED ON:**

a. Sugar substitutes like NutraSweet, Equal, Spoonful, etc. made with Aspartame. A better natural substitute would be Manuka honey or molasses, but only in very small amounts. Table salt has a chemical added to make it white in color; a better alternative is Bragg's aminos or sea salt.

b. Milk causes the body to produce mucus, especially in the gastro-intestinal tract. Cancer feeds on mucus. By cutting off milk and substituting with unsweetened soy milk cancer cells are being starved.

c. Cancer cells thrive in an acid environment. A meat-based diet is acidic and it is best to eat fish, and a little other meat, like chicken. Meat also contains livestock antibiotics, growth hormones and parasites, which are all harmful, especially to people with cancer.

d. A diet made of 80% fresh vegetables and juice, whole grains, seeds, nuts and fruit help put the body maintain an alkaline environment. About 20% can be from cooked food including beans. Fresh vegetable juices provide live enzymes that are easily absorbed and reach down to cellular levels within 15 minutes to nourish and enhance growth of healthy cells. To obtain live enzymes for building healthy cells try and drink fresh vegetable juice (most vegetables including bean sprouts), and eat some raw vegetables 2 or 3 times a day. Enzymes are destroyed at temperatures of 104 degrees F (40 degrees C).

e. Avoid coffee, tea, and chocolate, which have high caffeine levels. Green tea is a better alternative and has cancer fighting properties. It is best to drink purified or filtered water, to avoid known toxins and heavy metals in tap water. Distilled water is acidic, avoid it.

12. Meat protein is difficult to digest and requires a lot of digestive enzymes. Undigested meat remaining in the intestines becomes putrefied and leads to more toxic buildup.

13. Cancer cell walls have a tough protein covering. By refraining from or eating less meat it frees more enzymes to attack the protein walls of cancer cells and allows the body's white blood cells to destroy the cancer cells.

14. Some supplements build up the immune system (IP6 (Inositol hexaphosphate), Florssence, Essiac, anti-oxidants, vitamins, minerals, EFAs etc.) to enable the bodies own killer white blood cells to destroy cancer cells.. Other supplements like vitamin E are known to cause apoptosis, or programmed cell death, the body's normal method of disposing of damaged, unwanted, or unneeded cells.

15. Cancer is a disease of the mind, body, and spirit.

A proactive and positive spirit will help the cancer warrior be a survivor. Anger, un-forgiveness and bitterness puts the body into a stressful and acidic environment. Learn to have a loving and forgiving spirit. Learn to relax and enjoy life.

16. Cancer cells cannot thrive in an oxygenated environment. Exercising daily and deep breathing help to get more oxygen down to the cellular level. Oxygen therapy is another means employed to destroy cancer cells.

No plastic containers in the microwave; no water bottles in the freezer; and no plastic wrap in the microwave.

Johns Hopkins and Bethesda Naval/Walter Reed Army Medical Center are circulating this information in their newsletters. Dioxin chemicals cause cancer, especially breast cancer. Dioxins are highly poisonous to the cells of our bodies. Don't freeze your plastic bottles with water in them as this releases dioxins from the plastic.

Recently, Dr Edward Fujimoto, Wellness Program Manager at Castle Hospital, was on a TV program to explain this health hazard. He talked about dioxins and how bad they are for us. He said that we should not be heating our food in the microwave using plastic containers. This especially applies to foods that contain fat. He said that the combination of fat, high heat, and plastics releases dioxin into the food and ultimately into the cells of the body. Instead, he recommends using glass, such as Corning Ware, Pyrex or ceramic containers for heating food. You get the same results, only without the dioxin. So things such as TV dinners, instant ramen and soups, etc., should be removed from the container and heated in something else. Paper isn't bad but you don't know what is in the paper. It's just safer to use tempered glass, Corning Ware, etc. He reminded us that a while ago some of the fast food restaurants moved away from the foam containers to paper; the dioxin problem is one of the reasons.

Also, he pointed out that plastic wrap, such as Saran, is just as dangerous when placed over foods to be cooked in the microwave. As the food is nuked, the high heat causes poisonous toxins to actually melt out of the plastic wrap and drip into the food. Cover food with a paper towel instead.

Fight Back Against Online Scams, Hackers and Cyber Attackers

E veryday we fight a never-ending war against a slew of online scams that include computer viruses, malicious software and phishing scams.

Attacks by cyber thieves have become more frequent, evolving into complex schemes and duping even the smartest cyber savvy computer users. Brothers, we must always be on the lookout for the latest phishing scams, disguised as convincing emails or mock websites, which scam people into revealing personal information leaving them vulnerable to crimes such as ID theft. The following is the first in a series of advisories on protecting you and your family against cyber threats. Take heed.



CYBER SAFETY Checklist

For the Home User with Kids

- Parents, educate yourselves first: Know about online predators, financial scams, viruses, cyber-bullying and the pervasiveness of pornography on the Internet.
- ☐ Talk to your child: Open communication between parents and children is important to keeping your kids safe. Ensure that they can talk to you about things on the Web that make them feel uncomfortable.
- Monitor your children: Consider options like sharing an email account, checking your browser's history, keep the computer in a common room and maintaining access to your kids' accounts.
 - **Recommend kid directories:** There are a number of search sites geared for children. Others are targeted at teens.
- Parental control software: One option is to purchase software that establishes computer user time limits and controls access to sites, games, chat, and file sharing. It can be adapted to offer different levels of control for different ages of children.
- Install the right defensive software: Make sure you have quality anti-virus, anti-spyware, spam blocker, and a personal firewall, and keep security patches up-to-date.
 - Carefully select mobile devices: Look for digital device models that are "child-safe," which often don't provide camera or Web access. Some child-safe phones even let parents limit the numbers the phone can call.

Tell the Kids

Don't give out personal information: Make sure to never give out your name, email, home address, phone number, account numbers, Social Security number, picture or any other personal information.

- Look out for Internet scams: Online criminals think of clever ways to rob you. Don't get lured in by emails telling sad stories, giving away money or promising fun times.
- **Take care when shopping online:** Check with your parents first and then only buy from trusted online stores.
- Don't open unknown email: If you have no idea where an email comes from, take the safe course and delete it before opening it.
- Treat IM seriously: If your business uses instant messaging treat it just as you would email and stay on guard from dangerous software.
- Beware of file sharing: Discuss file sharing with your parents first and if they're okay with it, make sure to scan your downloaded files for viruses.
- Create smart passwords: Your online and computer passwords should be at least 8 characters long and include letters, numbers and symbols. Use different passwords for different accounts, change them every 90 days and never share them with anyone.


